Cerebral Ciphers





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
Everything Has a History



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Discussion Questions

The Genius Files # 4: From Texas with Love is a middle grade novel that includes a whole host of intriguing characters involved in a wide variety of adventurous activities. As the McDonald family travels across the southwestern United States visiting wild and wacky tourist attractions and museums, the reader is challenged to follow the action, learn from it, and make personal decisions with regard to their own future experiences.

Use the following discussion questions to engender group dialogue that will capture the lessons to be learned or themes that author Dan Gutman has woven throughout the plot line and character development. Small literature circles or whole class discussion can be used for this activity. (pages 20 – 90)





1. Dr. McDonald describes the old family cars as *practical, dependable, reliable,* and *boring.* Would you use the same words to describe him? Why do you think Dr. McDonald wants a cool car like the Ferrari? (pages 23–24)



- 2. Whenever the twins tried to be honest, their parents didn't believe them. Refer back to the story and recount a time when Mrs. and Dr. McDonald thought they were lying. Has that ever happened to you? Explain.
- 3. When Dr. Warsaw has Coke and Pep trapped in a vapor cabinet, he tells them a frog story explaining that we don't "react to changes that occur gradually" in our lives. (page 75) All the evil traps set in the





story were meant to harm Coke and Pep slowly and ingeniously. However, the twins' resourcefulness and fast thinking saves them every time. Discuss a few of their clever escapes. Share a time when *you* acted quickly to avoid danger or solve a problem.

- 4. Coke and Pep contrast the little Ferrari, "a steel cocoon that would protect them from harm" with the RV, "a rolling prison." (page 85) Why did the twins feel this way? Which car would make you feel "safer"? Which car would make you feel more "free"?
- The author reflects that "Sometimes we spend so much time and energy thinking about where we want to go that we don't notice where we happen to be." (page 88) Do you think Mrs. McDonald might be

a little guilty of this? Why or why not? Has there been a time when you were so focused on something that you missed what was going on around you? Explain.
