

Introduction

African-American religious life has played a pivotal but largely unheralded role in shaping many of the ideals that are central to our notions of democracy and justice in America today. Arriving on ships with names like Brotherhood and John the Baptist, slaves who had previously embraced a myriad of religions in their home countries were confronted with the Christianity of their captors.
